RABBI'S MESSAGE

Shalom, Temple Beth Sholom Haverim,

May is always a month that is filled with many different emotions surrounding the commemorations on our Jewish calendar and each of them intertwined with each other in purpose and meaning.



The month begins on the evening of May 5, through May 6, and that is Yom HaShoah. This day of deep and lasting memory seared in the soul of every Jew recounts the single greatest assault upon civilization, the genocide (that word was invented to mark the unique slaughter of the Jews during the Shoah) that took 77.5% of our people in Europe, one of three Jews in the world.

The Shoah marked the only time in human history when an entire people was marked for death because of who we are—Jews. Unlike the gypsies, the gays, the Slavs, and other innocents murdered by the Nazi genocidal machine, the Jews were the only group of people marked for death no matter age, location, status, city, or rural. If one was a gypsy who lived in Berlin, there was no threat to one's life. But Jews in Budapest, Paris, Brussels, Berlin, and everywhere else in Europe were hounded like animals and murdered to eliminate the presence of Jews and, yes, our Judaism from the face of the planet.

We must never forget them, 1.5 million Jewish children, 4.5 million men and women, tortured and murdered just because they were Jews, either born as Jews or converted to Judaism. It was a year ago when 30 of us from Temple Beth Sholom visited Treblinka and Auschwitz and tried to imagine places which, at the height of evil, saw over 10,000 Jews gassed each day.

We remember because we know that these Jews were our brothers and sisters, like us in so many ways. Not only were they murdered with no family in most cases to remember them, but their synagogues, their communities, their scientific research, their music and art, and the generations that might have been after them also disappeared forever, only living in our hearts and lives.

Then, on Sunday night, May 12, we observe Yom Hazikaron, Israel's Memorial Day for the fallen soldiers of the IDF as well as the victims of terrorism since the founding of the state in 1948. Israel comes to a standstill during the sacred hours of remembrance, and this year's Yom Hazikaron will be especially poignant with the loss of over 650 young men and women, victims of Israel's war for existential survival against Hamas and a world bent on seeing Israel destroyed. The sacrifice of Israel's finest leaves a permanent gash in our hearts, knowing that they died so that there would be a Jewish state and the perpetuation of the Jewish people in the land of our ancestors, Eretz Yisrael.

The following evening, Monday night, May 13th, begins the celebration of Yom Ha'atzmaut, Israel's 76th anniversary of existence. Also, this year's Independence Day will be tainted knowing that the war for Israel's survival continues in Gaza, in the north vs. Hezbollah, facing Iran and worldwide incomprehensible obsession with Israel.

A few reminders about Yom Ha'atzmaut: Every war against Israel began with an assault from external enemies, who are then defeated and then plea for mercy from the rest of the world. In 1948, there were 660,000 Jews living in Israel, attacked by five Arab armies bent on destroying Israel and murdering to the last its Jews. Israel in 1948 had one tank and no planes.

In 1967, 1973, 1981, and now October 7th, 2023, much of the Arab and Muslim world began wars, attacks, invasions, rapes, beheadings, and kidnappings to annihilate Israel and kill its Jews. Has anything really changed all that much since the Shoah?

Israel is the only Jewish state, and it comprises a territory that is the size of Wales, or El Salvador, smaller than the state of New Jersey. There are 54 Muslim countries...the countries directly surrounding Israel comprise a land mass the size of North America and a half!

In the past few years, Israel has had to absorb thousands of missiles aimed at killing as many innocent Israeli civilians as possible, with war a continuous reality with the Iran-led proxies Hamas, Islamic Jihad, and Hezbollah.

Why has there been such an outbreak of antisemitism since October 7th throughout Europe, increasing in America, and rife in the United Nations?

Like the historical legacy of antisemitism facing the Jewish people for over 2500 years, the same tropes are cast at the state of Israel:

- 1) Jews refusing to become like everyone else, insisting on our unique existence as am Yisrael. One of the chief sources of antisemitism is Jews refusing to assimilate and disappear.
- 2) Israel embodies the religion of Judaism, and the restoration of a Biblical people has unnerved many who thought that the promises of the Tanach/Torah had disappeared.
- 3) Israel is a place where nationalism, patriotism, and pride in the nation predominate, and nationalism is not popular in most Western countries, where international globalism takes precedence.
- 4) Israel has a strong military and a volunteer army and fights for its national existence, despised by Western nations after WWII, where fighting for freedom against violence and terror is not known or accepted as normal.
- 5) One pundit said that when you see an "anti-Zionist," you are looking at an anti-Semite.

When you see an anti-Semite, you are looking at someone who is also anti-American.

In other words, hatred against the Jews does not end with our people; it eventually consumes others around us. Terrorism of Hamas, if not defeated now, will end up coming, as many suggest, to "a theater near you."

This is an important month for us, with many thoughts we all have about the world we live in and hopes that Israel will find a way to win this war for its existence.

The world has a short memory, but we must never forget—that is our strength and the secret to our survival.

The Jewish people have overcome every challenge to our existence for all of the 4000 years of our existence, and we will overcome this difficult time for our people. We will...because we have "Hatikvah," the Hope for God's promises to continue forever. And from the blessing of life and peace which will come soon to Israel and the Jewish people, we will be able to be the eyes and hearts of a world that desperately needs us to prevail, and we will. We will.

My wishes to you all for a month of May that brings strength, uplift, and renewed hope.

Chaverim,

The month of May includes two very important modern-day Jewish observances: Yom HaShoah (Eve of May 5 through May 6) and Yom Ha'Atzmaut (Eve of May 13 through May 14). Both occurred in our time. In April 2010, I participated as an educator on the two-week March of the Living, spending one week in Poland visiting what is left of 6 infamous death camps and then proceeding to Israel, where the greatest miracle of the 20th century occurred. Out of the ashes of the Holocaust emerged the modern State of Israel.

Nine thousand Jewish teenagers from around the world joined us for this amazing journey. I recall the day when we visited Majdanek Death Camp in Lublin, Poland, where my grandparents Alfred and Mathilde Treidel perished. I separated from the group that I was assigned to in order to journey through this terrible place alone. As I slowly walked through the gas chambers, I could only imagine what my grandparents endured in this horrific place. At the other end of Majdanek was a large dome that sheltered a giant mound of human ashes. As I approached this memorial, I could only wonder if my grandparents' remains were part of this ashen mass. We held a memorial service, and afterward, everyone embraced; most were weeping uncontrollably. This was the most memorable experience of our painful journey through Poland. It haunts me to this very day.



After a week of witnessing the horrors of the Shoah, we all needed to be in Israel. It was absolutely amazing to see what had been achieved in such a short period of time. I recalled with pride that three of my great grandfather's first cousins arrived in Palestine during the Second Aliyah (early 20th century) and financed the Kineret Colony overlooking the Sea of Galilee. There is a large stone house (known as the Treidel House, photograph on the left) that, to this day,

is a national monument. When the colony (kibbutz) was under attack, the house was used as a fortress to protect the women and children, and when Baron Rothschild visited Palestine, he always stayed there. Ironically, it was built by another Alfred Treidel.

We all observed Yom Hazikaron (memorializing Israel's fallen soldiers) at various ceremonies, and the next day, we proudly marched together in the Yom Ha'Atzmaut

Parade in Jerusalem. That night, we partied on a boat sailing on the Sea of Galilee. At that moment we were all Israelis and experienced such great joy being as one with our Israeli brothers and sisters. The horror and sadness that we endured in Poland was converted to a sense of admiration and personal pride in what the Jewish people had created in such a short period of time.

My great-great uncle Hermann Treidel was the last President of the Jewish Community of Mayen, Germany. He took his own life rather than be deported to the death camps. Had there been a State of Israel, perhaps he, along with my grandparents and so many other relatives, might have completed their days in Tel Aviv. Had there been a State of Israel, perhaps my extended family would have been much larger today.

We can light candles on Yom HaShoah, promote Holocaust education, remember the 6 million, and work to ensure that it never happens again. But Yom Ha'Atzmaut should remind us that we must teach our children and grandchildren about the miracle of the State of Israel, and to do everything in our power to ensure that Israel will always endure.

MESSAGE FROM TBS MEMBERSHIP

Transformation 2024

We've just tried to re-live the transformation at Mt. Sinai around our seder tables. In truth, few of us succeeded in experiencing an authentic spiritual transformation.

But on October 7, nearly half the Jews in the world experienced a profound transformation. When I spoke with Israelis in Jerusalem in February, to a person they each said, I was a certain person on October 6, and I am a transformed person today. On October 6, I was full of bitterness.

Today, I would die for my country and my people.

Of course, most Israelis have had practice in transformation that we American Jews have not had. In the 1940's, they watched helplessly as Nazi armies murdered their European families and swept eastward across North Africa towards Jerusalem. In the 1950s, Israel was a country of tent cities of broken orphans who had limped in half-dead from Europe and those who had fled Arabia. In 1967 and 1973, they dug mass graves in anticipation of another genocide. In the early 2000s, their children who got on the wrong bus were blown to bits.

By October 6, they had buried these lessons but, even so, retained the inner toughness of survivors. On October 7, they re-learned all they had forgotten, and they were transformed again into love for one another.

We Jews in America have mostly been spared such catastrophes. So, can we achieve our own transformations after October 7? How could we do it? What would it look like?

For some, it might be to go to Israel, where they can feel the unity of the Jewish people. Some will make Aliyah. For others, it could be to redirect their philanthropy to organizations that directly support Israel. For others it might be to make support of Israel their top priority in voting. And for others it could be to "adopt" an Israeli soldier through an organization such as FIDF (Friends of the Israel Defense Forces.)

Coming together in our shuls to support Israel is the most powerful way that we can redeem October 7. If we can salvage transformation from the ashes of Kfar Aza, Hamas will never be able to claim victory.

This is happening already. If you haven't been to services recently at Temple Beth Sholom, you will be amazed by the increased numbers, the vigor and the emotion of the people. And you will experience joy when you feel the profound and emotional Zionism of our beloved Rabbi Altshuler.

In this post-October 7 world, welcome our new members, who, like us, are seeking the transformative power of Jewish unity:



LAPTOP DONATION DRIVE FOR AREA FOSTER KIDS

The Children's Guardian Fund (CGF) and Sarasota Technology Users Group (STUG) have teamed up to collect used computers and laptops. With a long history of recycling and safety, the STUG sanitizes (clears prior owners' information to protect senstive information that may be left on the computer at the time of the donation) the hard drive with a seven-step process that protects the donor's information. They then refurbish the laptop and install software that is typically required for school. Refurbished laptops are distributed to area students in foster or state care through the CGF and the Guardian ad Litem Program.

LIBRARY HOURS




