# RABBI'S MESSAGE

Shalom haverim of Temple Beth Sholom,

In just a few weeks, we will be welcoming the beautiful, magnificent, timeless holiday of Pesach/Passover, the narrative, as we read and study from our Haggadot at our Seder tables, about the miraculous origins of our people, Am Yisrael, the People of Israel. There is no other holiday that tells us about the history of events that occurred, most likely in the 13th century before the Common Era, 3300 years ago.

The story of our people, our struggle for freedom, of body and soul, a battle from slavery and degradation to freedom and dignity, has resonated with countless numbers of nationalities, religions, and people from around the world, who have found inspiration of the story of the Jewish people. The story of Passover, as told to us in the book of Exodus, has taught the world that every human being must have both physical and spiritual freedom because we human beings belong only to God and no Pharaoh or other human dictators. God demands freedom from oppression, whether it be national, racial, or intellectual - that message still resonates with most of the nations of the world, where less than 25% of the governments of this troubled world grant their people true liberty, democracy, and respect for human beings created in the image of God.

The Jewish people and our blessed state of Israel are going through the most traumatic time since the Shoah. October 7th will be emblazoned in the soul of not only the Jewish people and our Israeli brothers and sisters but the entire world. It was an alarm call set off by the most hideous, diabolical forces in the world, terror and the dehumanization of life, and Israel is enmeshed in a difficult war for survival, a war it fights for every human being in the world who cherishes freedom and life.

#### Where is our comfort?

Perhaps we should turn to the words in the Haggadah, words that are most likely around 2000 years old, written during the time of the Jewish rebellions against Rome, 66-74 CE and 132-135 CE (Bar Kochba rebellion mentioned in the Haggadah). It says:

And it is this that has stood for our ancestors and for us. Not only one (person or nation) has arisen to annihilate us, but rather in each generation, they arise to annihilate us. BUT THE HOLY ONE, BLESSED BE HE, RESCUES US FROM THEIR HAND.

I had thought in my younger years that this commentary of the Rabbis was inaccurate and inappropriate to our contemporary times, for how could it be after the Shoah that anyone or nation would attempt to annihilate the Jewish people? Certainly not in this generation, for this generation of humanity would prove that the Rabbis were simply wrong—we are free now!

Then came 1967, and Gamal Abdel Nasser declared his goal for the Arab world was the "destruction of Israel," echoed by leaders throughout the Arab world, by the Soviet Union, and many corners of the corridors of the United Nations. In the words of Iraq's president, Abdul Rahman Arif: "Our goal is clear—to wipe Israel off the map."

Yes, I was naïve then, and so many of us are naïve even today, seeing that Hamas' goal, Hezbollah's goal, the stated aims of the theological dictatorship of Iran, and even many in the Western world are screaming each day: "From the River to the Sea," calling for the annihilation of our only Jewish

state, founded by the blood and tears of our people these past 100 years, especially after the horrors of the Shoah.

Antisemitism is on the rise everywhere, including in our own United States. I just read this morning as I write this message to you that the Jewish community in London is now very much aware that it is not safe for Jews to be in the city of London on Saturdays or Sundays, and synagogues and Jewish organizations are being threatened daily.

But the prayer concludes with the promise that the Holy One, Blessed Be He, will rescue us from their hands. That is the source of our strength—the Jewish people have survived enemies in each generation: Ancient Egypt, Babylonia, Persia, the Seleucids, the Byzantine Holy Roman Empire, jihad, Stalin, Hitler, Khomeini, Khamenei, and now Nasrallah of Hezbollah and Sirwan of Hamas and leaving out a whole bunch of dastardly nations and individuals who yearn for our destruction.

We are here; we outlasted them all and built the most beautiful civilization in human history, and we shall overcome terror and the desire of much of the world to eliminate Israel and attack our Jewish institutions and being. There are  $14 \frac{1}{2}$  million Jews in the world, a statistical error in the Chinese population census, a population that constitutes less than %.02 of the world's population. But Jewish influence will continue, always disproportionate to our numbers, and the reason for that is what we have always represented: God's teachings, the Torah, and Rabbinic wisdom and ethics. They are eternal values, and they will continue in each of us as long as we stand up with pride for who we are and what we represent to the peoples of the world.

That is what the Haggadah implores us to remember at Passover time — keep the faith in our people's history and legacy, be strong, teach your children, through questions and dialogue, to continue the strength and resilience of our people to withstand evil and violence.

That is why we always conclude our Seders with "Next Year in Jerusalem," because we know that even through whatever trial we must face, God will be with us, will hear our prayers, and that evil will lose, and we will triumph. Goodness and peace will always prevail in the end.

Our enemies do not understand us at all. We will never be afraid because of our years of knowing that God's blessings will always win out for us and for all of our many friends who understand us and care for the survival of Israel and the Jewish people.

God bless you all with the strength of our Passover celebrations, to see you in synagogue for our services throughout the week of Pesach.

God bless Israel and its struggle for freedom and survival.

God bless the brave young ones, men and women, fighting each day for the Jewish people and Israel.

God bless the surviving hostages who only keep hope because they know of the solidarity of their people.

God bless all the individuals, not Jewish, who are fighting with us in solidarity.

God bless our synagogue, Temple Beth Sholom, that carries the light of our faith and people. God bless you all and your families this Pesach so that we can all sing, eat, and rejoice in who we are—forever!

Am Yisrael Chai and Hag Pesach Kasher v'Sameach!

# **Why Old Music Matters**

I'm a historian. For me, opening up an old book is like peering through a window into the wisdom of another world. The past, in its multiplicity and mystery, stands firm as a powerful source of revelation and possibility.

Such positive attitudes to the past are embedded within the Hebrew language itself. The Hebrew word *lifnei* - "before" - also simultaneously means "in front of." That which is past is visible —it lies before us. The future is *achareinu*—is after us, behind us, unseen. This is why the Hebrew Bible is largely composed of history, and biblical religions serve as legal and cultural responses to its divine memories.

In historical faith, God is not simply a transcendent metaphor for our ideals or a mystic oneness into which the human being must fold. The "scandal" of biblical thought is that God's relationship with humanity unfolds in a concrete and dynamic way. In such a world, the past becomes the sacred history of God's work, and fatalism must yield to the power of the redemptive action. As Will Herberg once put it: "Faith is responding to the call of God that comes to us from out of the midst of redemptive history."

But can such a thing be applied to music? Are the musical and aesthetic revelations of the past as valuable as the ethical ones? Musicologists often lament the lack of written sources that could reveal the melodies of Jewish antiquity, as if King David were to have only had a few sheets of staff papyrus on which to transcribe his secret chords. Ashkenazic Jews, with their love of minhag (custom), have long sought to set Jewish folkways and aesthetics beside the Torah itself. So goes the medieval saying, "minhag yisrael Torah hi — the custom of Israel is Torah." Unsurprisingly, the oldest Ashkenazic melodies are called misinai melodies — ones that come from Sinai, a parallel revelation of music to that of law.

In the nineteenth century, the explosion of Jewish music printing in the West led to a scribal culture in which Jewish melodies could finally become written down, composed, and canonized. Cantor Salomon Sulzer was in the vanguard of this revolution; like Beethoven, he published widely at a critical moment of popular access to music notation. Shir Tzion, his earth-shaking volume of modernized Jewish choral worship, spread as fast as physical books could be carried to the four corners of the Ashkenazic world. In this way, Sulzer was the first major prophet in the growth of a Jewish canon of aesthetic scriptures and the rise of a priestly culture of Jewish music in Western Europe. Not unlike the books of the Hebrew Bible, the "canons" of Jewish music that we know today are largely a result of their being written down.

As surely as God is the Lord of History, such canons of historical music will always have something to tell us. They can unite the melodic treasure of our scattered cultural family, serve as a tool for addressing local and national problems, and stand as rich sources of unexplored Jewish possibility. With this truth, we must also not let the embrace of them become a form of denial. Though the beauty and efficacy of such canonical music may bring comfort, it should not be a replacement for applying creativity to the musical and social problems of today. Like the opening scene of *A Serious Man*, we must not let cultural deference welcome a dybbuk into the house. In summation, I believe the best approach was eloquently expressed by our recent TBS guest, Cantor Josh Ehrlich: "The way I see it, a life of discovering new ways to look at old things is infinitely richer than a life spent chasing new things which invariably grow old."

It is the only potential source of division in the family. He and I will do anything for one another and maintain a close and warm relationship.

At Temple Beth Sholom as well as all synagogues, our most important goal is to build communities. This is done by embracing the things we agree upon, uniting us, and building upon them. Recently, we embarked upon a campaign to raise money to purchase an ambulance for Magen David Adom. It did not matter who we support for president, or whether we view ourselves as being liberals, conservatives, or just middle of the road. It did not even matter if we like or dislike Netanyahu and how he governs. The important thing was that we were doing critical work that would help to save lives in Israel. Because we pulled together and were extraordinarily generous, we raised enough money to purchase two badly needed vehicles that would save the lives of soldiers fighting in Gaza. There was even money left over to donate to MDA's blood banks. This is what a unified community can achieve.

We are entering a presidential election season in which the rhetoric will become heated, and we will be bombarded with political commercials through the media. Many will wear their political sensitivities on their sleeves. This is not a time to allow politics of any nature to enter through the doors of Temple Beth Sholom. I urge you to check your political views at the door and not engage in political discourse at services, in classes, at TBS events, or even at Onegs and Kiddushes.

Let's focus on those good things that we have in common. TBS is a great place to speak about our kids and grandkids. Let's focus on the welfare of one another and on topics that will bring smiles to our faces. Let's focus on how important Israel is to us and what we can do to help improve the community around us. Most of all, allow our conversations to focus on how we can make TBS an even better place.

As we approach the Passover season, both Ann and I extend our warmest wishes to you and yours for a very happy and Kosher Pesach.



#### **NEW BOOKS IN THE ALCOVE**

The Last of the Seven: A Novel of World War II by Steven Hartov, 2022 – A spellbinding novel of World War II based on the little-known history of the X Troop – a team of European Jews who escaped the Continent only to join the British Army and return home to exact their revenge on Hitler's military.

Bucharest Diary: Romania's Journey from Darkness to Light by Alfred H. Moses, 2018 – This memoir tells the story of Moses' work with Romania's Jewish community, his interactions with the democratically elected leaders of post-communist Romania, and his service as U.S. ambassador to Romania from 1994-1997 as the country just began to transition out of the rubble of communism.

**The Last Words of Moses** by Micah Goodman, 2023 – The author offers an original reading of Deuteronomy that sheds light on some of the book's most penetrating insights to show how

the divine is expressed through Moses to the children of Israel in the desert and today.

Surviving the Forest by Adiva Geffen, 2018, fiction – This is a WWII historical novel based on the true story of a Jewish holocaust survivor. Shurka and her young family live in a Polish village when WWII breaks out. After fleeing to a neighboring Ghetto, they realize that the Gestapo was taking Jews away on trucks every night and they decide to disappear into the deep forest to try to survive the Holocaust.

Churchill's Secret Messenger by Alan Hlad, 2021, fiction – This enthralling novel follows a young British woman recruited from Churchill's typing pool to become an undercover spy in Nazi-occupied France and Lazare Aron, a Jewish French Resistance fighter. It is a stirring epic spanning the entire war, as an ordinary woman and man with extraordinary courage fight for what they love and know is right.

Awakenings: American Jewish
Transformations in Identity, Leadership, and
Belonging by Rabbi Joshua Stanton and Rabbi
Benjamin Spratt, 2022, nonfiction – A clear,
frank, and courageous call for transformation
in American Jewish life. The authors remind
us that the Jewish story is multifaceted in its
scope and in its ability to influence society
through its people. A stirring exploration of
what Jewish life could be.

The Feather Merchants: & Other Tales of the Fools of Chelm by Steve Sanfield, 1991, nonfiction – Thirteen traditional Eastern European Jewish tales of the town of Chelm and its silly citizens.
