RABBI'S MESSAGE

What is the *miracle of Chanukah*? History teaches that it was the few (Maccabees) persevering against the *many* (Syrians). Rabbinic legend suggests it was a vial of lamp oil, enough to light the great menorah in the temple for one day that lasted for eight.

I suggest it was neither!

The ancient rabbis were very clear in teaching *Ein sa'much al ha'nissim* - *Don't rely on miracles*.

Their message was directed to a population of Jews in the 1st and 2nd centuries suffering under Roman oppression and persecution. The Jews prayed for miracles, and when they didn't occur, they became disillusioned.

The rabbis taught that we make our own miracles. They don't just happen. One who understands the basics of classic warfare knows the Maccabean victory was no miracle. It was a combination of good strategy, superior soldiering, and a less-than-enthusiastic opposition!

The miracle of Chanukah was the spirit it imbued in future generations of Jews. The story of Chanukah fueled modern Zionist aspirations leading to the creation of the state of Israel.

The Chanukah message of religious freedom continues to impact both Judaism and Christianity, and the holiday's positive images of Jewish strength and pride are reflected in the smiling faces of Jews of all ages.

This year, the first candle of Chanukah is lit on Thursday evening, December 10.

May the light of the *Hanukiyah* (menorah) inspire in each of us the resolve to stand together as Jews against those who would oppress, persecute, and endanger the religious and human rights of all people.

Let There Be Light (By Oil)

We stumble out of the plethora of Jewish Holy Days and Holidays into the month of Cheshvan (also called Mar Cheshvan, Mar means bitter) since there are no holy or holidays this month. Most Rabbis are happy to arrive at this month and generally breathe a sigh of relief at the well-deserved break, but this Rabbi starts the planning of the gastronomically enjoyable arrival of the fried food in oil holiday, also known as Chanukah!

I know you've heard of the Ashkenazi Jewish latkes (fried potato pancakes) and the Israeli sufganyiot (fried jelly-filled donuts), but did you know there are a plethora of varied Chanukah foods from around the world? From Columbia to India to Ethiopia, there are unique ways of celebrating the same holiday that remembers the miracle of the tiny bit of oil that lasted for eight days. In Italy it's fried chicken and in Greece it's honey-soaked doughnuts called loukoumades.

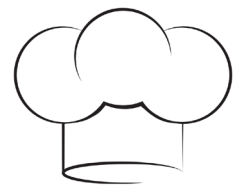
So many different kinds of yummy fried food is a reason to celebrate and a way to connect to our brothers and sisters around the world by bringing the flavors and aromas of their kitchens to ours. The key is to remember the miracle of light in a time of darkness, how one tiny light can light up the space for as long as eight days so we can celebrate the full holiday. Oil is that reminder, so fried foods it is!

How will you bring the miracle of light into the space you reside in? How will you share that with others? If COVID-19 isolation wasn't a thing right now, I would suggest we all cook a different recipe from somewhere in the world and bring it to share with the community, with a short story about the Jews that live in that area and why that food is a tradition there.

But since we are sitting in our own spaces mostly isolated, perhaps we can look up different recipes and cook and share with each other online, or we can drop off different foods for people who cannot cook, who are alone and need connection, or have a socially distanced celebration outdoors? Whichever way you can bring the reminder into your home will change the space into a holy space, and however you can be a light unto the nations is the point of celebrating light and miracles. As we continue to walk through a dark time in human history, may we all step forward and bring our lights together to create a less scary time in the darkness.

Making these recipes from geographical areas where Jewish life is but a memory for museums, where our people have faced the loss of Judaism through assimilation and forced migration, helps us honor Chanukah's theme of maintaining Jewish identity, religion, and culture in the face of adversity, as the Chanukah song says: *Kol echad hoo or katan, v'kulano or eitan...* Each of us is an individual small light, but together we have such might!

Zengoula with Lemon Syrup (Iraqi Funnel Cakes)

INGREDIENTS

For The Syrup:

2 to 3 lemons
1/2 cup water
1 cup sugar

For The Dough And For Frying:

1 1/8 teaspoons (1/2 package) active dry yeast
1 1/4 cups warm water (100° F to 110° F), divided
1 cup all-purpose flour
3/4 cup cornstarch
Scant 1/2 teaspoon salt
2 quarts mild oil with medium-high smoke point

INSTRUCTIONS

For The Syrup:

1. Using a zester, remove the zest from 1 of the lemons in long strands. Halve and squeeze enough lemons to yield 1/3 cup juice.
2. In a small pot, stir together the lemon juice and zest, water, and sugar over medium heat. Bring to a boil and cook, stirring frequently, until the sugar is completely dissolved and clear, about 1 minute. Pour into a pie pan and let cool.
3. The syrup can be made 1 day ahead, covered, and refrigerated.

For The Dough And For Frying:

1. In a small bowl, stir together the yeast and 1/4 cup of the warm water and let stand in a warm place until the mixture bubbles, about 10 minutes.
2. In a medium bowl, using a fork, stir together the flour, cornstarch, and salt. Stir in 1/2 cup of the warm water and the yeast mixture. Then slowly stir in enough of the remaining 1/2 cup warm water until the dough is lump-free and the consistency of thick pancake batter. You should have 1 1/2 to 2 cups batter.
3. Cover the bowl with plastic wrap and refrigerate until doubled in bulk, at least 6 hours and up to 24 hours. The dough will be loose and spongy and have a yeasty aroma.
4. To make the fritters: Scrape the dough into a 1-gallon (4-liter) resealable plastic bag or large pastry bag fitted with a 1/4-inch (6-millimeter) plain pastry tip and set the bag in a bowl for support. Let the dough stand for about 30 minutes before frying. Line a large plate with paper towels. Place the prepared plate, tongs, a small spider or slotted spoon, the syrup, and a tray to hold the finished fritters near the stove.
5. Pour the oil to a depth of 3 1/2 inches (8 1/2 centimeters) into a 4- or 5-quart (4- or 5-liter) pot, wok, or electric fryer and heat to 375° F. If using a plastic bag for the dough, snip 1/4 inch (6 millimeters) off one of the bottom corners, cutting on the diagonal, to create a piping tip. Roll the top of the pastry bag closed to move the batter toward the opening. Don't worry about air pockets.
6. Pipe a bit of the batter into the hot oil. The oil should bubble around the batter immediately. If it does not, continue heating the oil and try again.
7. Pipe the dough into the hot oil, creating 3- to 4-inch (7 1/2- to 10-centimeter) coils or squiggles, letting gravity help push the batter out. Be careful not to crowd the pan. Fry the dough, turning over at the halfway point, until bubbled, golden, and crisp, 4 to 5 minutes total.
8. Use a spider or slotted spoon to fish the fritters out of the oil, drain them briefly on the towel-lined plate, and then drop them into the syrup for a moment or two, turning them to coat evenly. Lift them out of the syrup and transfer them to the tray in a single layer to cool.
9. Repeat with the remaining batter, skimming any loose bits of dough from the hot oil between batches to prevent burning. Scrape any batter that escaped into the bowl back into the pastry bag to make more pastries.
10. The cooled pastries can be piled on a platter. Pour any remaining syrup over the top.
11. The fritters taste best served the same day. Store loosely covered at room temperature.

Sephardic Leek Patties (Keftes de Prasas)

INGREDIENTS

2 leeks trimmed and cleaned	1/4 cup breadcrumbs or gluten free breadcrumbs
1 egg	1 potato
1/3 tsp salt	vegetable oil to fry

INSTRUCTIONS

1. Trim and wash leek very carefully as they can hold a lot of sand. Soak and rinse a few times.
2. Peel the potato and slice it and the leeks and place in a large pot with water, cover and bring to boil. Remove from heat and let stand 5 minutes, then drain.
3. Place all the leeks, potato, egg, salt, and breadcrumbs into a food processor and blend until the mixture is blended.
4. Put about 1/2-inch of oil in a frying pan over medium heat.
5. Scoop out an egg-sized amount of mixture, form into a ball then flatten into a patty. Repeat until all the mixture is used.
6. Gently place each patty into the frying pan and cook for 5 minutes (or until golden) then turn over and cook for another 5 minutes or until golden and crispy.
7. Transfer to a paper towel-lined plate and serve immediately (or keep warm in the oven on low).

Polish Chanukah Cake: Gâteau de Hannouka

INGREDIENTS

5 apples (3 Fuji and 2 Granny Smith, or any combination of sweet and tart apples), peeled, cored, and cut into 1/2 inch pieces (about 6 cups)	1 teaspoon baking powder
Grated zest and juice of 1 lemon	1/8 teaspoon salt
10 walnut halves, roughly chopped	2 tablespoons chopped almonds
1 1/2 teaspoons ground cinnamon	1 1/4 cups plus 2 tablespoons sugar
2 cups all purpose flour	4 large eggs
	1 cup vegetable oil, plus more for greasing
	1/4 teaspoon almond extract

INSTRUCTIONS

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees, grease a Bundt pan or a 9- by- 13- inch baking pan.
2. Toss apples in a large bowl with the zest and juice of the lemon, the walnuts, and the cinnamon.
3. Pulse together flour, baking powder, salt, almonds, and 1 1/4 cups of the sugar in the bowl of a food processor fitted with a steel blade. With the food processor running, add the eggs, oil, and almond extract, processing until just mixed.
4. Spoon 1/3 of the batter over the bottom of the pan. Scatter the apples on top, and cover the apples with the remaining batter.
5. Sprinkle top with the remaining 2 tablespoons sugar (you'll need less if using a Bundt pan).
6. Bake for 45-60 minutes, or until golden and cooked through. The cake will take a shorter time to bake in the shallow rectangular pan than in the Bundt pan

High Holidays in Paradise

Never in our wildest dreams would we have considered traveling during the High Holidays. We enjoy being with family and friends in synagogue, catching up with people we don't see enough during the year, and the festivity of the holidays. The spirituality of being in a congregation, listening to the chazzan, praying, and hearing the shofar are important to us. After services, we have friends join us for lunch and continue the celebration with traditional and new recipes.

This year, COVID-19 was going to keep us from celebrating in the meaningful way we enjoy. There would be no services during which we would see friends and family. Lunch was not going to happen. It was looking like an uninspiring holiday period. We decided to put our heads together and come up with a plan.

We figured if we had to Zoom to services anyway, we could do it from anywhere. As travel advisors, we'd been itching to travel again and to find safe places clients could visit. Few places were open to Americans. Hurricane season ruled out the Caribbean. East Africa was enticing but staying put for the days of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur seemed silly when we knew we'd be itching to be on safari.

We settled on Tahiti. Formally called French Polynesia (Tahiti is the main island's name), this territory of France in the South Pacific consists of 118 islands in five archipelagos. The best-known islands, Mo'orea and Bora Bora, are part of the Society Island group. We considered attending the sole synagogue in Tahiti for services, but it was recommended that we reconsider since the rules for gatherings were strict... but there is a Sephardic synagogue there and there's a brief but interesting Jewish history!

Airline schedule changes required some compromises, but we were committed to participating in services and laying low on the holidays. With one exception, we agreed that our observance would be

on Eastern Time even though we were 5,400 miles and six time zones away.

We left Friday morning before Rosh Hashanah and flew to Los Angeles... and we were in the air during evening services. We logged into the plane's WiFi and attended from 30,000 feet. What a unique experience! Also unique was eating our airplane dinner with one of the round challahs I had baked and a little Manischewitz wine that I'd packed in my carry-on! We boarded our 8-hour flight to Pape'ete

(the capital of Tahiti) and woke up as we arrived at 5 am.

It was too late for east coast services when we got to the ferry that would take us to Mo'orea, so we Zoomed into Temple Aliyah in Los Angeles and enjoyed the morning service from the ferry terminal and even on the ferry. After that, our day was leisurely, and we began the New Year appreciating the beauty of the island. The second day of Rosh Hashanah we woke at 3 am to join the Park Avenue Synagogue in NY for services... and we relaxed the rest of the day. Our lunch included the second challah I had brought and more of the wine!

We learned something interesting when we wondered which direction to turn to face Jerusalem during prayer; it turns out that Tahiti is an "antipode" to Jerusalem, which means it's diametrically opposed to the holy city... and all directions are equidistant to the Temple Mount. We could face any direction we wanted! Ultimately, we chose east because it's our tradition, but we thought it was a very interesting fact!

On our last day in Mo'orea, after the holiday, we toured this gorgeous island and then flew to Bora Bora. We had three spectacular days there, touring,

playing in the water and relaxing. From there we went to the island of Taha'a, which has only 5,500 residents and is home to vanilla plantations, pearl farms, and an organic rum distillery. The islands and the water around them are breathtakingly beautiful. Photos can't begin to capture the specialness of the place. The sights, sounds, smells, and peacefulness of the region make it impossible to adequately describe.

Because we had decided to observe the holidays on Eastern time, Yom Kippur was a unique experience. After our breakfast – delivered by outrigger canoe to our overwater bungalow! – I snorkeled in the resort's coral garden then hurried back for a quick lunch just before *Kol Nidre*. We participated in the service from the deck of our bungalow, looking out over the lagoon and the islands in the distance. With the sun high in the sky, we began our fast. The rest of the day was spent reading and relaxing and we were early to bed.

Park Avenue Synagogue's Yom Kippur service began at 2:30 a.m. our time, and Marc was up, wearing his tallit, and singing along with the cantor. I joined a little later at 3:15 a.m. Through the wee hours of the morning, we prayed... and watched the sun as it rose over the island. After services we went back to sleep. Somehow, fasting was easier than ever, and before we knew it, it was time for *mincha* and *ne'ilah*... and it was only 11 am! Again, we logged in...this time from inside our bungalow, but looking out the beautiful picture window at the beauty of the island...and finished the holiday at 1:22 pm.

We don't anticipate having this type of holiday experience again, but we enjoyed our visit to Tahiti even more than we expected. Being in a place as spectacular as these islands made us appreciate G-d's creation and feel humbled by its beauty. The COVID High Holidays were as memorable as they could have been...yet next year we'll be happy to be back to the same old experiences that we love!

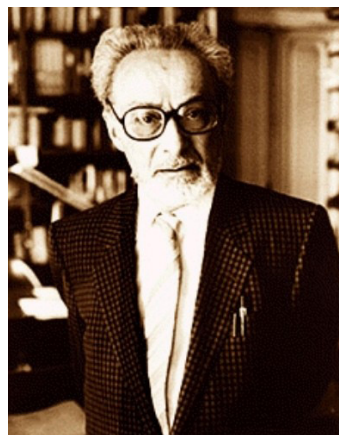

TBS to Offer Six-Session Archeology Course

For the third consecutive year, Temple Beth Sholom will be offering an archaeology course with Steven Stark-Riemer. This year's course is titled *Siblings – Part 2: Second Temple Judaism and the Development of Early Christianity and Rabbinic Judaism*.

The course will be offered on six consecutive Thursday mornings at 10:00 am beginning on January 7 via Zoom. These classes are open to the entire Sarasota-Manatee Jewish community.

In discussing his course, Stark-Riemer states that “The religions we know today as Judaism and Christianity were born at the same time, nurtured in the same environment, and their parent was Second Temple Judaism. In this course, we will examine the Dead Sea Scrolls and Jewish apocalyptic eschatology as a prelude to exploring the roots and early development of the ‘Siblings’, their responses to the First and Second Revolts against Rome, and finally, their ‘Parting of the Ways.’”

An attorney by profession, Steven Stark-Reimer graduated magna cum laude from the City College of New York, studying anthropology, and specializing in archeology. In 1970, he conducted fieldwork in Israel at the Tel Gezer excavations under the direction of William G. Dever, then Director of the Hebrew Union College Biblical and Archaeological School. Mr. Stark-Riemer graduated in 1972 and was elected Phi Beta Kappa and accepted into the Ph.D. program in Anthropology at UCLA on the strength of his senior thesis on the origins of agriculture in the Nile, Indus, and Mekong River Valleys.

Mr. Stark-Riemer has acquired a devoted following in his adult education endeavors in the Sarasota/Manatee Jewish Community. The titles to the six sessions are: “Introducing the Dead Sea Scrolls,” “The Texts within the Scrolls,” “Apocalypticism Meets Politics,” “One More Sect,” “Another End and Another Beginning,” and “The Parting of the Ways”.

We are at a time in our nation's history when the police are under a great amount of pressure. The Jewish community here in Sarasota has seen hate crimes in our backyard.

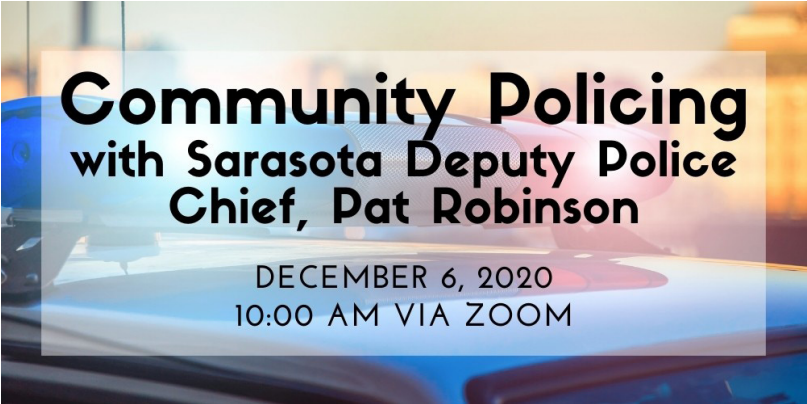
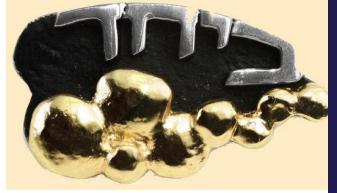

COMMUNITY DAY SCHOOL

Feeling the music at Community Day School

As the COVID-19 pandemic continues to force changes in many aspects of our lives, Hershorin Schiff Community Day School is finding new ways to bring maximum learning and enjoyment to its students. When it comes to the arts, the school is employing creative ways to make the subject matter meaningful and fun.

According to the National Association of Music Educators, singing and playing instruments needs to happen outdoors, which can be tricky for teachers to manage with unpredictable Florida weather and while overseeing young children. In response to current realities, music and drama teacher Michele Walker has instead concentrated on

recorded music, drama, and also movement.

Younger grades are now focusing more on creative movement and rhythm activities, along with drama. Each of our grades has focused on creating its own

superhero characters, through which they explore their inner strengths as well as their nemeses and sidekicks. They have even created their own catchphrases. Age-appropriate activities have included writing a play, which was videotaped; performing monologues; writing and performing a rap; and acting out stories and songs. All of the younger grades created a superhero-themed music video together.

The older grades are learning about self-expression by using a more dramatic approach and exploring music in order to express emotions. Walker allowed them to design their own curriculum this trimester, offering them a checklist from each discipline. They chose to do a Saturday Night Live-style video performance, which involved learning about satire and parody, and writing,

creating, and videotaping their own scenes as well as “news” stories and music videos.

“Our children have been through so much this past year and my emphasis has been on their well-being: helping them to process the anxiety, stress, and change. I am amazed at how organized and inspired the students have been. They have all shown so much initiative and creativity.”

Walker notes that her main goal has been to enable the children to be safe while expressing themselves and having fun. *“And if we can learn together this year, that’s good, too. It’s a unique time.”*
