

RABBI'S MESSAGE

Shalom Temple Beth Sholom,



While the rest of the nation is in a January freeze, we are fortunate to be able to enjoy the sunshine here in Sarasota. We certainly have a busy month ahead: the celebration of our Bar Mitzvah, Israel Carrillo (Jan. 10th)—Israel is an exceptional young man. I had the privilege of getting to know Israel via my cousin, Sandy Altshuler, in Spokane, Washington. Some years ago, I helped my cousin's congregation, Temple Beth Shalom, when it did not have a rabbi, and worked closely with Dr Howard Glass, the ritual chairman, who brought his wisdom and devotion to the shul. We continued to be in touch, and lo and behold, Howard and his wife, Sue, came to Sarasota for part of the winter months.

Howard's daughter, Sarah, came to see me some months ago and told me that her son, Israel, wanted to study for Bar Mitzvah and to celebrate when her parents came to Sarasota in January. So, here we are, getting ready for a wonderful celebration of a young man proudly wanting to be Jewish and to be here at TBS with his mother and grandparents from Spokane! Please join us.

Also in January, we will be beginning our joint classes with Reverend Kenneth Blyth and the St Armand's Key Lutheran Churches, starting Tuesday, January 20th, 2:00 pm, session one at St Armand's Lutheran.

Our theme this year is "Life Cycle", how our respective religious faiths and traditions deal with prayer, birth of a child, marriage, death, mourning, and much more.

Being Jewish means striving for spiritual excellence, moral uprightness, righteousness, so in that spirit of our spiritual quest, what are the nine things that we need to do to become a mensch, an ideal Jew in the fullest moral sense:

The inspiration for these suggestions is from Joseph Telushkin's Jewish Wisdom:

1) Do not stand idly by while your neighbor's blood is shed—that is, we Jews can never stand by idly while there is suffering, especially to our people. To turn away from Israel today during its time of great need falls far short of the moral compass from this verse in Leviticus 19:16.

2) Do what is right and good in the sight of God (Deuteronomy 6:18)

WE should be mindful each day, every encounter with others, to remember that all of our conduct must be of the highest moral standard, to simply do what is right and good.

3) To follow the way of the good and keep to the paths of the just (Proverbs 2:20).

Our Rabbis linked this verse in Proverbs to our conduct in the realm of the business world. One cannot be a mensch without linking our highest standards of moral behavior when we are at work, when we take employees under our care, to remember that we

must always safeguard honesty in dealing with others.

4) The ways of Torah are pleasant and all her paths peaceful(Proverbs 3:17)....the inspiration of our menschlikeit must always recognize the root of moral behavior before God: the Torah and our Jewish ethical standards. A mensch is humble and always seeking wisdom from our Torah, our Sages, our History, and Literature.

5) You shall be holy, for I, the Lord God, am holy (Leviticus 19:2). To a mensch, every ritual act of a Jew must be linked with moral behavior. The greatest example of that would be the laws of kashrut, that makes us mindful of our relationship to others, to nature, to live our lives of Kadosh Kadosh Kadosh—of Holy, Holy, Holy, linking heaven and earth in every ritual act.

6) Justice, Justice shall you pursue (Deut.16:20)

The struggle against crime, against evil, is paramount for a mensch. As the rabbis taught in the midrash: Those who are kind to the cruel will end up being cruel to the kind.

Justice in the fight against terror and evil, kindness cannot prevail.

7) You shall not covet your neighbor's wife, nor crave your neighbor's house or field...his ox or his donkey, or anything that is your neighbor's (Deut. 5:18)

It is natural that we want more than what we have, but in order to be a mensch, we need to appreciate each day what we have rather than which we do not have. We need to temper our covetous impulses so that we develop a humility that breeds gratitude, not envy.

8) Am I my brother's keeper? (Cain to God, Genesis 4:9)

To many of our Rabbis, the entire is an affirmative answer to this question posed by Cain. Everything we Jews do is about caring for the other-our spouses, our children, our grandchildren, our fellow Jews, all human beings. We must always be our brother's keepers—that is why the Torah was given to us.

On that note, may our month be guided by uplift and kindness, the highest standards of behavior given to our ancestors to teach the world that the purpose of life is to reach for the Heavens, to God, lift our heels (during Kedushah). We can do it, and it all begins with each of us.

Have a wonderful month of January and see you in synagogue during these glorious days.

Shalom Haverim,

Do you ever feel like the days just fly by? The hectic pace of the day and all the things we “must do” leave you wondering where the week went. This happens to me quite often.

As luck would have it, one of my all-time favorite movies, the 1985 classic comedy Ferris Bueller’s Day Off, was on the other day. In this movie, Ferris is a high school senior who plans the most epic ditch day ever in the city of Chicago. The day includes a trip to see the Cubs play baseball, a visit to the fine arts museum, and driving around in his best friend’s dad’s Vintage Ferrari. Ferris even hijacks a parade and makes himself the star. When all the craziness is over, Ferris delivers this line that hits home: “Life moves pretty fast, you don’t stop and look around once in a while, you might miss it.”

Maybe it is the fast-approaching end of another calendar year, but Ferris’ quote has been replaying in my mind.
