RABBI'S MESSAGE

Dear haverim,

We have another "all-star" Distinguished Speaker joining us on Tuesday, January 17th, at 1:30 pm, via Zoom. Straight from Oxford University, Oxford, England—PROFESSOR JOHN BARTON, the most esteemed Biblical scholar in the world, will be with us, as he was last year, for another enlightening session on his newly released book on BIBLE TRANSLATIONS—why they make a difference, especially in the dialogue between Judaism and Christianity.

Dr. Barton and I became friends while I was in London, and I always felt privileged to be in the presence of this amazing scholar, a humble man, a mentsch in every sense, a friend of the Jewish people. That's how we met! After reading his monumental HISTORY OF THE BIBLE, and the care and accurate scholarship and knowledge displayed about Judaism, a keen sensitivity to our religious tenets, I was determined to bring this man into my life. That was about five years ago, and we have not turned back since we met at Oxford, as we have become close seekers of the truth, of the wonders of the Bible/Tanach.

My love affair with the Bible began when I was a student at the University of California at Berkeley, where I met and studied for an intense two years with the esteemed Biblical scholar and rabbi, Jacob Milgrom, author of the most extensive and scholarly work on the book of Leviticus/Yayikra, three volumes, Anchor Bible. Rabbi Milgrom's commentary has been essential to the Jewish Publication Society's works on Leviticus and Numbers. Well, he was the greatest professor I ever had; he made the Bible come to life, the scholarship and the wonder of every nuance of the layered texts.

While we, the Jewish people, are "Am Ha-Sefer," the People of the Book, the Book being the Bible; unfortunately, few of us truly know what the Bible is, why it is a revolutionary text, why it is the most read "Book" in the history of humanity, the Book that shaped the world as we know it today.

I hope that we will have many opportunities to study the Bible, and my plan is to make that the focus of our classes next year. How did the Jewish people begin? How did our Torah/Bible emerge in the midst of two large civilizations, Egypt and Mesopotamia? Why is it that the book of Deuteronomy became the most quoted book, not just of Biblical texts but of all available literature, at the time of our country's origins at the end of the 18th century? How did a quote from the book of Leviticus, "Proclaim liberty throughout the land..." appear on the Liberty Bell? Why did Thomas Jefferson and Benjamin Franklin propose that the motto of the United States should be the picture of the Israelites leaving Egypt? How did our fourth president, James Madison, become a university major in Hebrew? He was fluent in our language! Why did our second president, John Adams, propose in 1825 that the Jewish people should be supported in any effort to reclaim the Land of Israel as their homeland?

How did the Prophets of Israel revolutionize our thinking about God, social justice, messianism, and the sacredness of the city of Jerusalem, Zion, and Eretz Yisrael?

What a miracle it was in 1946 when Bedouin teens discovered the Dead Sea Scrolls that changed forever biblical scholarship! Before the Dead Sea Scrolls, the earliest complete text of the Bible was the Aleppo Codex dated from the 9th century CE, but after the Scrolls were

discovered, the greatest archaeological find in history, we could now date Biblical texts back to the 3rd century BCE!

My theory is that we refrain from reading the Bible because there are so many forces in our culture that keep telling us that the Bible is somehow a primitive text that belongs on the trash heap of the past, and, therefore, not worthy of a modern intellectual search. The Bible is, in our limited knowledge, associated with Christianity, and not a "Jewish" endeavor to study and know Tanach.

This is all a shame because the Bible contains the core of who we are as Jews and how our people and faith shaped western civilization, and should continue to be read, studied, and absorbed. After all, it contains the formula that can still transform our thinking and our world.

Please join Professor Barton—perhaps you will all walk away from that session on how the Bible has been translated into other languages and why when the original text is translated from Hebrew to English, for example, how those translations have distorted the authentic message of the Tanach.

That and more will be discussed with the pre-eminent scholar of the Bible, John Barton. You will not want to miss this incredible opportunity.

Thus far, we have listened to Professor Jack Wertheimer, former provost of the Jewish Theological Seminary, Rabbi Joel Rembaum, our guest for Installation weekend, Colonel Richard Kemp, and Rabbi Dr. Elliot Dorff, the leading halachic scholar of the Conservative movement, and now....John Barton.

My goal was to make Temple Beth Sholom the meeting place for our greatest thinkers and friends—we have accomplished that already and much more to come.

I wish all of you a wonderful month of January, with hopes for a new secular year, 2023, that will be filled with hope and optimism.

Dear Congregants,

Recently I attended a meeting of the local synagogue presidents. All of us are struggling with difficult decisions in the life of our congregations. As I begin my second year as president, I find myself contemplating my role and the role of the Board of Directors and what guides us.

and fundraising.

Every month I receive countless communications related to safety, strategic planning, building use, new programs, and fundraising. You name it, I've heard about it. So has your Board. We take up issues needing our attention at every meeting. Board decisions are often difficult and require hours of reflection on the part of the leaders you have chosen. At the heart of every decision, the Board must base its decision not on our personal wants but what best serves Temple Beth Sholom.

But that doesn't provide a complete answer. Two sets of questions stemming from that must be addressed:

- 1) Who decides what best serves Temple Beth Sholom? What informs the Board's decision-making to ensure that we are using the proper lens for making decisions?
- 2) Does the Board have a role in safeguarding **TBS of the future**? If not, who has that responsibility?

The answer to number 1 is that our Mission Statement is what should provide guidance. Neither I, nor clergy, office staff, or Board have that responsibility. We all serve the congregation's mission, which is approved by the congregation from time to time. It is the guiding light by which our Board should base decisions, and by which the congregation must judge our effectiveness.

To number 2, I would argue that it is incumbent upon the Board of Directors to be the guardians of TBS' future. TBS of the future has no voice of its own. It has no input. Unless the Board thinks beyond the here and now, there may not be a TBS of the future. We must balance – and serve – the needs of today with the needs of the future.

Currently, our Mission Statement reads as follows:

Temple Beth Sholom, a dynamic, egalitarian Conservative Temple, aims to be a leading congregation in the Sarasota-Manatee area by providing the Jewish Community [with] outstanding religious, educational, and cultural experiences through synagogue, schools, and programming.

As president and leader of the Board, I am obliged to serve the congregation's mission. Before weighing in on decisions relating to the temple, I consider our mission, and whether my recommendation is in line with the mission. I think not only about what will make our current membership happy, but also contemplate how our mission will impact the future TBS.

To make decisions in line with the wishes of our congregants, the Board of Directors wants your answers to the following:

- 1) Is our mission statement still relevant? If not, will you help us draft a new one? What do you agree or disagree with? Will you support the mission financially and/or by volunteering?
- 2) Should we look beyond our current needs and consider the needs of TBS in the future?

Contact me with your thought and ideas. We can always improve, but to do so, we need to march to the same drummer. Let us know what you think is important!

In His Name

I would like to thank the congregation, so many members of whom have wished me well over the past few months. This past November, I received an award from the Cantors Assembly – the Samuel Rosenbaum Award for Creativity & Scholarship – on which occasion many congregants went out of their way to convey their good wishes.

More than an award itself, it was an honor to be linked with the memory of Cantor Samuel Posenbaum (with whom some of our members from Posenbaum)

of Cantor Samuel Rosenbaum (with whom some of our members from Rochester grew up!).

I have long taken a personal interest in Cantor Rosenbaum's career and life, which was storied with many decades of leadership and accomplishments. My initial attraction to his personality was the breadth of his creativity as cantor, poet, lyricist, writer, builder of the modern cantorate, and collaborator with dozens of high-level composers and musicians. But now that I'm a parent and have been a working cantor for about 15 years, I am more attuned to the behind-the-scenes sides of him – his reputation for being a wise and fair counselor and his sensitivity and listening. These attributes are key to being a good musician and a good person as well. Cantor Rosenbaum sent letters of condolence or congratulations with authentic and heartfelt sentiment and deeply moving words. He sat with many of my colleagues in order to help them through professional and personal challenges. It is this spirit of empathy that is most appealing to me now. This is perhaps in the spirit in which Abraham Joshua Heschel once said: "When I was young, I admired clever people. Now that I am old, I admire kind people."

Jewish tradition is actually an embodiment of this Heschelian principle. We are a small people, focused on being an example to the world rather than controlling it. Performing the mitzvot is about exercising inner power, not outer power. It's easy to be impressed by what is powerful, popular, or beautiful, but it is the things that people often don't get awards for – their care, kindness, and sensitivity – that are most precious of all.

GREEN BEAN CASSEROLE

1 1-lb. package of frozen green beans
1 can cream of mushroom soup, undiluted
1/2 cup of mayonnaise
1 tablespoon of lemon juice
1/2 cup grated cheese
1 cup crushed cheese crackers

Cook green beans according to package and drain. Arrange them in a buttered casserole dish (use 9x13 "Disposable Aluminum Pan"). Mix soup, mayonnaise, lemon juice and cheese and spoon over the beans. Top with crackers. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes. Cool, cover with foil and freeze.





Freund Scholar-in-Residence Welcomes DR. MOR ALTSHULER

February 3 - 5, 2023

We are delighted to welcome Dr. Mor Altshuler from Israel as our Scholar-in-Residence for this year. She brings a wealth of

knowledge of Israeli history and culture, and the current mileu in Israel.

Dr. Altshuler is a scholar and publicist. Her career as a publicist and commentator includes appearing as a panel guest on Israeli television and writing opinion columns, most recently in *Haaretz* newspaper. She is currently completing research in collaboration with Dr. Amit Kleinmann on Rabbi Menachem Rappaport, the forgoten inventor of modern cryptography.

Holding a doctorate from the Hebrew University of Jerusalen, she authored *The Messianic Secret of Hasidism*, published by Brill Academic Publisher (2006), and *The Life of Rabbi Yosef Karo*, published by The Tel Aviv University Press (2016). This study is a biography, which depicts the unique character of the great legislator of Jewish Law, the author of *Shulchan Aruch* and the leader of the Golden Age of Safed in the 16th century.

Both in her academic research and in her publicist writing, Dr. Altshuler expresses the rich heritage of her family in the Land of Israel. On her grandmother's side, she is a descendant of Rabbi Menachem Mendel of Vitebsk, the leader of the Hasidic aliyah to Safed, Tiberias and Hebron in 1777. On her grandfather's side she is a descendant of the Altshulers, pioneers in the first aliyah and founders of Rehovot in 1890. She and her husband, Tzion, live in Carmei Yosef, Israel. They are parents of Avshalom and Hemday, and proud grandparents of Abigail, Aluma, Zuri, and Michael.






