## **RABBI'S MESSAGE**

Shalom, Temple Beth Sholom Haverim,



We have all been shocked at what has happened at our universities of higher learning. The source of the greatest amount of Jew-hatred (antisemitism) is taking place among esteemed faculty members and students at some of the most prestigious universities in the world: Harvard, Yale, Princeton, Brown, Northwestern, UCLA, and UC Berkeley, to name just a few.

The hatred and the promotion of violence and terror (Hamas) are stabbing us in the heart with the reality that, in many ways, our educational system is not working to sensitize a new generation of our American youth. What is most abhorrent, in my view, is the realization that so many of our so-called "scholars" and students are ignorant. Screaming support for Hamas, advocating intifada (violent uprising), and yelling "From the River to the Sea," a Hamas charter call for the elimination of the Jews (not just the state of Israel) is not only morally reprehensible, but all this hatred also demonstrates an incredible lack of knowledge of Jews, of Israel, and of the history of the middle east conflicts.

I would assume that when all this disaster calms down there will be a much-needed scrutiny of the way we are teaching (or not teaching) our next generation to be responsible students of life, of goodness, of history.

It is especially disheartening, as Jews, to know that there is this huge lacuna in learning and the values that should be taught through the incredible journey of seeking truth because our people have contributed way beyond our numbers to the financial viability of these institutions of higher learning. Perhaps we can play a decisive role when our society begins to wrestle with how we have failed as a society to protect the sacred task of teaching, educating, and learning.

Appropriately, this month we will be celebrating the holiday of Torah, the holiday of Shavuot, *zman matan torahteinu*, the time of our receiving of the Torah at Sinai. There are few rituals surrounding this major holiday, on the same level as our beautiful Passover and Sukkot. Still, there is one standout custom of Shavuot that reminds us of the value we Jews place upon learning. It is not the minhag (custom) to eat dairy during Shavuot hours—it is the tradition of Tikkun Leyl Shavuot, the study of Torah all night long as a remembrance of our receiving the Torah at Sinai, approximately 3350 years ago.

If I could share with you a few verses from the Mishnah of Pirkei Avot: Chapter 2, Mishnah 5: *Do not say, When I have the leisure, I will study, for you may never have leisure* 

In other words, we often put off our need to learn about Jewish life and all aspects of learning because we feel we can "do that later." No, there's an urgency to our learning, our seeking knowledge, especially as we see how few people know much of anything (including our own people) about the history of the state of Israel and Zionism and the history of antisemitism.

Chapter 2, Mishnah 6: *Lo am Haaretz Hasid*—in other words, without learning (Jewish texts and Judaism), it is impossible to strive for true religiosity, piety, and goodness. A Jew who does not

know much about Judaism, the Rabbis teach us, cannot possibly be the person we were meant to become. Study of Judaism leads to the performance of the mitzvot, of righteousness. Talmud Torah k'neged kulam—the study of Torah is equal to all the other Commandments, again because knowing leads to the performance of God's Commandments, which leads to goodness, which leads to a better world.

Chapter 2, Mishnah 8: (The) more Torah, more life; more study with colleagues, more wisdom; more counsel, more understanding; more good deeds, more peace. The acquisition of a good reputation brings personal gain, but one who has acquired Torah has acquired eternal life.

In other words—The key to true longevity and happiness, from a Jewish perspective, comes from study because of all our false pursuits in material terms, nothing compares to the soul we create, the wisdom we develop. Learning makes us humble for what we do not know, and it makes us respectful of differing viewpoints in our own search for truth. The reason our tradition valued the rav, the scholar, is because Jews throughout our history knew that knowledge was the key to Jewish survival and longevity. Our Jewish books are our reputations, our ability to understand the world around us, and by our learning we plant the seeds for Jewish continuity for generations to come (i.e. The "better world").

With all that , I do hope that you will all join us for our annual Tikkun Leyl Shavuot, our study sessions, beginning Tuesday night, June 11th, 6:30pm right here at TBS.

Our guest scholars are leading the following sessions: **Rabbi Ed Weinsberg**: "Rabbinical Views on Wars of Defense" **Sue Spector**: "To whom does the earth belong? Ba'al vs. Shomer" **Don Friedman**: "The Clever Design of the Jewish Calendar" **Norman Olshansky**: "American Jewry and Israel in the News" **Rabbi Altshuler**: "What happened at Sinai?"

I hope, as well, that you will join us for our upcoming 2024-2025 classes, rotating two classes each Wednesday morning at 10:30:

Jewish History: The Shoah and the History of Israel, and Islam from a Jewish Perspective ("Islam for Jews").

We will be joined by members of the St. Armand's Key Lutheran Church and Reverend Blyth for many of our sessions. We will also have our now annual class with Reverend Blyth and the church on 4 Tuesdays in February on "How Jews and Christians Read the Same Biblical Texts Differently." Stay tuned for a full schedule!

I wish all of you a summer of reading and learning...there's no better way to enrich the soul!

### **Message From Cantor Neal Taibel**



My name is Neal Taibel, and I am ecstatic to be your new cantor. During my visit to Temple Beth Sholom, I could feel the warmth that this congregation brings into a tefillah space, and I look forward to bringing my own love of Judaism and tefillah to this community. Before I introduce myself, I want to thank a few people that helped make this possible. I am beyond appreciative of the members of the search committee for putting their trust in me. I also want to thank the staff of TBS for their caring welcome and Rabbi Altshuler, who graciously shared the bimah with me. He helped me see TBS through his lens and better understand the depth of opportunities that lie

ahead. I am eager to start our partnership and collaboration. Lastly, I want to thank Al and Ann Treidel, who were the first people to reach out to me and made me feel like part of the family. Everyone has been so kind, and I hope that I can return the favor and continue to make this place feel like a spiritual home.

So now for those of you wondering; "Who is our new cantor?" I then went on to the University of Miami, where I received my Bachelor of Music in Vocal Performance and had the pleasure of being mentored by Rabbi Lyle Rothman, the university's Hillel Rabbi. His encouragement led me to my cantorial studies at Jewish Theological Seminary. In summary, I have been blessed with guidance and mentorship of wonderful people since I was a kid. They nurtured my profound connection to Judaism and allowed it to evolve into something that can be shared. My hope is that one day I will be able to pass these lessons and gifts onto others.

Now for the less serious side of me. My two biggest hobbies are sports and music. I enjoy playing guitar and piano, and I love all types of music, from Rock to Pop to Opera to Jazz to R&B. I enjoy watching almost all sports and rooting for the Houston Rockets, Astros, Texans, and Dallas Cowboys, and now that Tampa isn't too far away, the Tampa Bay Lightning. So, if you are wondering why I chose TBS, the answer is community, one that already feels like home and where I believe I can contribute. ### LIFE & LEGACY<sup>™</sup> MEMBER SPOTLIGHT



### Carolyn Kaplan Member of the TBS Life and Legacy Society

Carolyn Kaplan, a long-time Sarasota resident and member of Temple Beth Sholom, will be 100 years old this summer. Her life of fulfillment and happiness began as a story of tragedy, escaping Nazi Germany, to opportunities in America, a life devoted to Judaism and synagogue life.

Born in the forest region in Southern Germany in 1924, her family was well established in the community. It was a small village with about 1,500 people. Fifteen families were Jewish. Her father was a well-respected leader in the Jewish community, a successful food purveyor and merchant, and was also well-thought-of in the general non-Jewish community.

Carolyn and her younger brother had a normal childhood in a traditional Jewish environment. Shabbat was always special. She looked forward to Simchat Torah when girls in the congregation could come down from the balcony and be with the men during the Torah procession. She said it was a real joy to be able to sit with her dad while the women above threw candy. She had many friends, both Jewish and non-Jewish. Her house was always a congregating place for friends. It even served as a place for the Jewish kids to study Jewish subjects with a religious school teacher who came regularly to teach them Hebrew, prayer, and Jewish tradition.

Problems began when in 1932, the Nazi party was gaining strength. In public school, the 2 Jewish students were forced to sit in the back of the room, and the other students were ordered to shun the Jewish ones. They were told Jews were the weak "link" affecting the German "chain." Carolyn was taken out of school by her parents and put into a regional Jewish day school. Things got worse in 1933 when Hitler was elected. Carolyn remembered: "Bricks were thrown at our windows, graffiti put on the stores and sidewalks. Nazi party members were marching in our neighborhood and entering Jewish homes. One person was beaten."

It was then, after a meeting with the other Jewish families, that a decision was made to leave. One family went to Argentina, one other family and hers went to the U.S., and the rest went to Holland, only to be slaughtered later by the Nazis.

Her family was able to get to the U.S. and settle in Chicago, where they immediately got involved with a synagogue of German Jewish refugees. They met in the auditorium of Temple Sinai. Carolyn couldn't believe how casual people were about their Judaism. She was fortunate that she had studied some English in Germany which helped her as she entered public schools. She loved art and music and also wrote and performed in

school plays. She was smart, had an A average in high school and got a job as a secretary in the stock yard office of Swift and Company. Her work success resulted in a scholarship from the company to attend Bryant and Stratton Business College. After getting her degree she continued to work at Swift and Company.

She met her first husband, Rudy Lintz, at the KAM Temple social hall where newcomers were welcomed to establish their own traditional congregation which became known as Ezra Habonim. At the forming of the first youth group, Rudy was elected President and Carolyn became secretary. Thus her synagogue involvement began continuing with her being a Hebrew school teacher for many of the following years. Her original scripts and her Hebrew Bingo game made learning Hebrew fun. She was also active in Sisterhood, was the religious school's PTA president, and wrote a monthly column for the bulletin

She and her first husband Rudy Linz had three children, two girls and a boy. They owned a fabric store until they retired and moved to Sarasota. Rudy had golfing buddies who frequently went to Sarasota and retired there. Carolyn immediately got involved with TBS. "I sat in the sanctuary, and it was so peaceful and welcoming. Somehow, it just spoke to me."

She also got involved with Sisterhood and remembered fondly her interactions with Audrey Watson, Donna Lerner, Goldie Feldman, and Barbara Rothstein. She was President of Sisterhood and initiated the Light of Torah awards and membership in the Women's League. She and Beverly Silverstein helped to get the gift shop table into its own designated room (the beautiful Judaica Shop). She served as secretary on the TBS Board with Presidents Neil Malamud, Marty Sonnenfeld, and Natalie Leffert. She also volunteered in the Library.

When Rudy, her husband of 43 years, died in 1988, the support and caring of the congregation made a big impact on her. When asked to describe her relationship with TBS at that time, she said: "The support I received brought me out of grief and continued to be my spiritual home."

She met Meyer Kaplan at TBS, and they got married in 2001. They were married for 10 years.

Carolyn is now at AVIVA, where she continues to volunteer and chairs the Religious Activities Committee. She also chaired the Aviva Kobernick Residents Association.

When asked why she made a legacy gift to TBS, she said, "I feel very strongly that this generation needs to protect the future and maintain the beauty of Judaism. I look upon it as an obligation. Judaism is a big part of who I am. We owe it, legacy giving, to those who were slaughtered for just being Jewish."



#### **GREEN BEAN CASSEROLES**

#### **SPARCC**

We continue to collect personal care items for SPARCC (Safe Place and Rape Crisis Center.) ### LAPTOP DONATION DRIVE FOR AREA FOSTER KIDS

The Children's Guardian Fund (CGF) and Sarasota Technology Users Group (STUG) have teamed up to collect used computers and laptops. With a long history of recycling and safety, the STUG *sanitizes* (clears prior owners' information to protect senstive information that may be left on the computer at the time of the donation) the hard drive with a seven-step process that protects the donor's information. They then refurbish the laptop and install software that is typically required for school. Refurbished laptops are distributed to area students in foster or state care through the CGF and the Guardian ad Litem Program.

#### BIMAH BASKETS ARE DÉCOR, BUT THEY ARE SOO MUCH MORE...



This fiscal year, through the efferts of The Bimah Basket Project, TBS Sisterhood was able to donate \$2,850 to both All Faiths Food Bank & Jewish Family & Children Services.

On each side of the Bimah, on a stand, sits a gift basket that contains replicas of food. TBS Sisterhood seeks sponsors each week to sponsor the baskets in honor of a special event or in memory of someone special. Proceeds from these sponsorships are divided 30% to be donated to All Faith's Food Bank, 30% to be donated to Jewish Family and Children's Services, and 40% remains to be used by TBS Sisterhood.

#### LIBRARY HOURS


