RABBI'S MESSAGE

Dear haverim of TBS:

Spring is upon us this month, Passover is approaching, and this is the most beautiful season of the year.

One month before Pesach's onset, we will celebrate the minor festival, Purim, the holiday of "Lots." We all know that Purim is a raucous celebration of our victory over Haman's plot to exterminate the Jews of Persia some 2500 years ago. It was miraculous—the heroism of Mordechai and Esther overcame the decree from Persia's foreign minister that could have spelled the very end of the Jewish people forever.

And so it has been throughout Jewish history—in each age of our existence, there have been varied attempts to eliminate us, sadly. The Egyptians attempted to do that during the period of the Pharaohs—miraculously, Moses was spared and led our people to their eventual freedom.

The Romans attempted to crush the Jewish rebellions in 66-74 CE and 122-125 CE (Bar Kochba) in the face of excruciating Roman oppression. Though one-third of our people was eliminated by brutal Roman retribution and our people could no longer step foot in Jerusalem, the spirit of our people continued to defy the horrible historical circumstance. Jewish learning led by the Rabbis continued to keep the spark of Torah study and Mitzvot alive and vibrant.

In the middle ages, both the Christian Empire and the Islamic Empire saw Jews as either God killers or forgers of Scripture, rejected by God. As a result, Jews were victims of grotesque brutality in both Empires—separation, theological enmity, violence, second-class citizenship status, economic and social discrimination, and, in both parts of the world, doomed to a life of constant migration and struggle to merely survive. And despite all this barbarism, the Jewish people nurtured philosophers, scholars, righteous ones, poets, artists, musicians, medical pioneers, our literacy a salvation at different periods, especially in medieval Spain, to both Christians and Muslims.

In our more recent history, the scourge of racial antisemitism, which was first promulgated by the Catholic Church in the 15th century, grew to be the most virulent antisemitism that the world had ever witnessed, leading to the annihilation of 77.5% of Europe's Jews and one-third of our entire population. Despite a genocide that should have by all logic depleted any vestige of faith, or strength to continue, our people rallied behind the greatest miracle of all human history—the rebirth of the Jewish state in 1948. If the Shoah could not have deterred our will to survive and live as Jews, nothing else could possibly dampen our faith in the future and in God.

That is why we celebrate at Purim time. Destruction attempts against our people will ultimately fail—the Babylonians, the Romans, the Assyrians, the Holy Roman Empire, the Islamic Empire, and all isms ultimately fail, but the Jewish people continue to live and to celebrate its existence.

It is very fitting that on Tuesday, March 14th; we will be listening to one of the most

dynamic and brilliant journalists, writers, and thinkers of our times, Melanie Phillips. She will be discussing the most recent stage of antisemitism, and perhaps no less threatening to our survival as Jews, the antisemitism of anti-Zionism, or the many attempts to de-legitimize Israel and abet the many parts of the world that are using anti-Israel sentiment to camouflage their base hatred of Jews, antisemitism. You will not want to miss our time with Melanie Phillips, a regular contributor to the Jerusalem Post, Jewish News Syndicate, the Times of London, and many other publications.

I met and befriended Melanie when in London. We have remained close friends, and we had a wonderful Shabbat lunch at her Jerusalem home last month. A special woman; a passionate lover of the Jewish people and Israel.

I hope to see you at our Purim celebration as we will together read Megillat Esther, the book of Esther, and remember in ancient times our people's bravery to live and survive as Jews, a pulse that has never ended in the annals of am Yisrael.

Let's prepare for Passover and what will be an amazing Seder at the synagogue—if you have not made your reservations yet, please hurry and do so because I would anticipate that we will be filled to capacity!

My wishes to you all for an uplifting month of March—classes, lectures, services and more, only at Temple Beth Sholom.

Matzah & Meaning

Every Passover, matzah becomes my major source of cognitive dissonance. It is the bread of affliction - the food of desert wanderers who were freed from slavery. And yet, like turning soy into veggie sausage or "facon," we always try to gussie our matzah up into something that it is not. Rather than remembering suffering and oppression, Pesach is



I am not writing to lament the state of matzah today. A purely ascetic Passover just would not do. Our rabbis rejected this notion by inventing the Seder, which was adapted from the symposium - a raucous, philosophical drinking party of their Greek neighbors. In their Seder (much more orderly indeed), the rabbis preferred luxury and study over re-enacting past immigrant trauma - and I'm with them in that regard. But I do want to bring awareness as to what matzah means - and what we are supposed to think and feel when we "just say no" to the yummy, yeasty treats that we all love the rest of the year:

- 1. God forbade yeast in the Temple not just on Passover, but all of the time: "Every grain offering you bring to the LORD must be made without yeast, for you are not to burn any yeast or honey in a food offering presented to the LORD (Lev. 2:11)." But why? How is it that God regularly prefers matzah to mandelbrot? The explanations for this are many. Leviticus scholar Dr. Jacob Milgrom relates it to the symbolism of fermentation, explaining: "Leaven is the arch-symbol of fermentation, deterioration, and death, and hence taboo on the altar of blessing and life." So perhaps matzah, a simple bread, has a life-affirming message for us all, and encourages us not to seek benefit from the power of destruction.
- 2. My former Professor, Dr. David Kraemer, offers a more cultural explanation for matzah's importance in his 2007 article to the Forward: "Significantly, food historians are of the opinion that leavened bread originated in Egypt, probably less than a millennium before the pyramids were built. Egyptian culture was the first to produce leavened bread, and leavened bread was a symbol of Egyptian culture... The Torah, by commanding the elimination of leavening, was demanding that Egyptian culture be left behind. The Torah's view, as expressed in the bread we do and do not eat on Passover, is that Israelite culture should not be borrowed. It should not rely on the culture of the past. It should begin anew, freshly leavened by the 'yeast' of Torah, revealed for the first time in Sinai."
- 3. Finally, my rebbe and teacher (and wife), Rabbi Elyssa Austerklein, reminded me of an interpretation cited over 1,000 years ago in the Sefer HaChi-nuch: Leavened bread "puffs itself up" in baking, just like our egos puff themselves up when we are worshipping ourselves. Matzah, on the contrary, is flat and humble, encouraging us to see ourselves as "right-sized" and in correct relationship to our Creator. Matzah must also be made quickly - encouraging us to develop our quality of alertness. We are swift to do good deeds rather than waiting around, hoping our willpower will "rise" to the occasion.

Matzah isn't just a prohibition. It's a metaphor for greater things. This year, let's offer those things to each other and to God. I look forward to joining you with my family next month in Sarasota.

GREEN BEAN CASSEROLE

1 1-lb. package of frozen green beans
1 can cream of mushroom soup, undiluted
1/2 cup of mayonnaise
1 tablespoon of lemon juice
1/2 cup grated cheese
1 cup crushed cheese crackers

Cook green beans according to package and drain. Arrange them in a buttered casserole dish (use 9x13 "Disposable Aluminum Pan"). Mix soup, mayonnaise, lemon juice and cheese and spoon over the beans. Top with crackers. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes. Cool, cover with foil and freeze.

Put your last name on a piece of masking tape on the foil. Bring to Temple the week of delivery and put into the freezer in the kitchen.

IDELSON LIBRARY BOOK REVIEW

The Escape Artist by Jonathan Freedland The Man Who Broke Out of Auschwitz to Warn The World Reviewed by Eric Faerber

There is an ever-increasing number of books written on the Holocaust, both fiction and non-fiction. This is certainly timely in keeping the Holocaust forever present in our minds, in the face of deniers and the continuously decreasing number of survivors to tell of their past.

A new book, "The Escape Artist" by Jonathan Freedland, has already received critical acclaim. The author is a noted British journalist who writes a weekly column for The Guardian and presents a contemporary history series on BBC.

The title is somewhat misleading as many might erroneously think his is a biography of the famed escape artist Harry Houdini, who incidentally was also Jewish! The escape artist is Rudolf Vrba, born Walter Rosenberg in Slovakia in 1926. He escaped from numerous camps during World War II, thus earning the title by the author. Vrba was the first Jew to successfully escape from Auschwitz.

He was only 14 when his hometown of Trvana became part of the Slovak republic, allied with Hitler. All Jews were forbidden to attend school and banned from most jobs. He escaped across the border to Hungary but was captured and sent to a slave labor camp in Novaky. He escaped from there, was re-captured, and transported to Majdanek, ultimately arriving at Auschwitz on June 30, 1942.

After his arrival, he was appalled by the emaciated, skeletal figures who had arrived before him. Fortified watchtowers heavily guarded the camp with searchlights and SS guards with ferocious dogs.

He had various assignments, which included cleansing the arriving cattle cars, working in the SS food store, part of hard labor groups building a factory, and shoveling gravel in quarries.

He was sent to "Kanada," a vast warehouse storing the possessions removed from the transports. He was requested to search for valuables in the luggage which contained clothing, family photographs, pots and pans, children's toys, tinned foods, and even diamonds concealed in tubes of toothpaste. He came to realize that these were possessions brought with the Jews, who thought that they were being led to a new life; however, they were nowhere to be seen. They had vanished.

He soon realized that this was "a factory of death." It was crucially important to the Nazis that no one knew the truth. If the Jews knew what was coming, the author surmises, "what sand might they be able to throw in the gears of the machine that was poised to devour them?" Even a small amount could be enough.

Rosenberg had been a brilliant student in science and mathematics, and thus he was able to remember the number of train arrivals with the number of Jews on each train and extraordinary details of everything he saw in the camp.

He was determined to warn the Jews of Europe and the world at large of what was happening. In order to make this possible, he knew that he had to escape.

He and a fellow prisoner, Fred Wetzler, lay underneath a wood pile near the perimeter for 72 hours. The wood pile was covered with tobacco-soaked petrol to throw the guard dogs off their scent. They crept through the fence and headed 75 miles south to Slovakia.

Their harrowing escape reads more like a fictional adventure story. He adopted the name of Rudolf Vrba, an influential Czech Catholic priest, and his fellow escapee Fred Wetzler became Josef Lanik. Jewish leaders in a town in northern Slovakia helped them compose a comprehensive 32-page single-spaced report, with maps of Auschwitz and displaying the layouts of the crematoria.

The report reached Walter Garrett, a British journalist working in Switzerland who broke the news of mass extermination in Auschwitz on June 24, 1944. This report was brought to Alan Dulles, who was then a senior US intelligence officer who said that they must intervene immediately. He had apparently passed it on to others, but it took a further four months for the report to reach Washington. The head of the Office of War Information did not publish it because it was felt not to be credible. It was labeled "too Semitic" by an official publication of the US Army.

The report was intended for the Zionist leadership of future president Chaim Weizmann and future prime minister Moshe Sharett in Jerusalem but reached London. Prime Minister Churchill urged Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden into action. Weizmann and Sharett met Eden in London, demanding that railway lines to Birkenau and other places be bombed. Eden contacted the government minister in charge of the Royal Air Force, who rejected the idea. President Franklin Roosevelt had previously heard eyewitness testimony about the Holocaust in 1943, including Polish diplomat Jan Karski. The Allies' response was that the best way to stop genocide was to defeat Germany militarily.

The document was also sent to political, Catholic, and Jewish leaders in Hungary, where a large number of the Jewish population was already being deported to Auschwitz. After seeing the report, Miklos Horthy, the Hungarian regent, halted the deportation of 200,000 Jews in Budapest in order to gain favor with the Allies.

There are many extremely interesting revelations in this book, including the fact that US reconnaissance planes flew over Auschwitz in the spring and summer of 1944 and took aerial photographs. These showed everything that was in the Vrba-Wetzler report but were subsequently never looked at!

After the end of World War II, Vrba became a renowned biochemist, initially working in Czechoslovakia, then Israel, which he regarded as a gateway to the West, and finally working in a laboratory in Vancouver. He served as a valued resource for noted chroniclers of the Holocaust. His personal life had many setbacks. He was noted to be a very contentious person, repeatedly denouncing the failures of the West and Jewish leaders to save more Jews during the Holocaust.

This remarkable book will have you thoroughly engaged as you read through a completely comprehensive report of Auschwitz, and all that occurred there, combined with a very gripping escape through Eastern Europe which almost appears to be fictional.

The author rightfully hopes that the name Vrba will now be remembered with other heroes of the Holocaust, such as Anne Frank, Oscar Schindler, and Elie Wiesel.



Sale of Hametz Every Jew is required to rid their homes of food items containing any of the five grains forbidden on Passover: wheat, oats, barley, rye, and spelt. There are two suggested ways of removing non-perishable food items containing "Hametz": 1.) Donate them to a local food shelf, or 2.) place them in a closed-off area for Passover and have them technically sold to a non-Jew who is not responsible for the observance of Passover.
