# RABBI'S MESSAGE

Shalom Temple Beth Sholom,

The month of October begins with our observance of the holiest day on the Jewish calendar, Yom Kippur, our special time for serious spiritual reflection-of our lives, our moral compass, the state of the Jewish people around the world, and our commitments reaffirmed to the state of Israel in its battle for survival. Hopefully, we leave this Yom Kippur, renewed, cleansed after battling our own foibles and faults, purified with thoughts of forgiveness to others and to ourselves. No more gossip, no more grudges, no more hatred, no more lying, no more deceit, greater commitment to exploring and affirming our Jewish existence. Teshuvah-we pray for a real "return" to God and to each other. The way that we express our religious/Jewish commitments is in the way we conduct ourselves with others.

We pray on Shabbat evening for our children and grandchildren with the words of the Priestly Blessing and asking God to: Yisa Adonai pan'av eilecha v'yasem lecha shalom, bless our children by having God's presence be reflected in their faces. In other words, we see God when we see the godliness in others, in their faces, in their eyes, the carriers of our souls.

I hope that we will look upon each other in that "light"—seeing the presence of God in each encounter with each other, in peace and with uplift.

The words "Yom Kippur" mean "Day of purging", wiping away the wrongdoing in our souls with new commitments to God and Torah. Let us hope we will have greater peace this coming year.

And we will celebrate that hope with the holiday week of Sukkot, our Matan Simchateinu, our celebration of joy, of the simple gift of being alive and smelling the etrog. The small gifts reflect a soul that cherishes every speck of divine blessing.

The week of Sukkot culminates in the celebration of Simchat Torah, marking the end of the Torah reading cycle and beginning from the beginning of Genesis once again. And our two honored members this Simchat Torah, our Hatan Torah, Joel Feder, and our Kallat Bereishit, Paula Rothman, will receive our appreciation for their continued devotion to our synagogue.

We must also remember that October 7th is upon us, the second anniversary of the most horrific attack against the Jewish people since the Shoah. It will again be a time for reflection,



prayer, reaffirmation of our solidarity with Israel, and resolve to be strong Jews, never cowering to those who would prefer our demise and even deaths.

There are some of our Sages who felt that the most important date in this Holiday cycle is Rosh Hodesh Heshvan, the new month of Heshvan, the second month of the Jewish calendar, observed and celebrated this year, Wednesday-Thursday, October 22-23. Why Rosh Hodesh? Because the holiday will have passed, and if the Holidays made any impact upon us at all, the Rosh Hodesh represents truly the beginning of our implementation of all our new resolve to climb closer to God and what He expects of us all.

As we shared during the High Holidays, a Jew is never mired in the past; we are of a people who never gives up our "Tikvah", our "Hope". That is why Israel's national anthem is called "Hatikvah", the Hope. There is a tomorrow, there is change, there are new dreams and new affirmations, for ourselves, for our congregation, for our United States, for the Jewish people, and for the state of Israel.

Tomorrow will be better than today, and we have been given the God-given power to make this world and our lives what they ought to be rather than what they are today.

My wishes to you and your loved ones for a gmar hatimah tovah, a good seal to our prayers on Yom Kippur, a Modaim L'Simcha, wishes for Holiday joy and happiness, and a Hodesh Heshvan tov-a good month that will allow us to inculcate into our souls and in the life of the world around us, all the lessons we have learned during this sacred month blessed by the Almighty.

God's blessings may be upon us all. Peace to Israel and the Jewish people, and ultimately, one day, all humanity.

# **CANTOR'S MESSAGE**



Shalom Haverim,

I recently saw the new Superman movie in theaters. As some of you may already know, this film is particularly relevant to the Jewish community because not only is Superman inherently Jewish, but he was also created by Jewish writers Jerry Siegel and Joe Shuster. In addition, his Kryptonian name, Kal El, has origins in Hebrew, which translates to Voice of God, and now, for the first time ever, he is played by a Jewish actor.

David Corenswet stepped into the iconic role and put on a spectacular performance. He showed a sense of compassion and humanity from Superman that has been missing in recent performances. The main premise of this movie is that Superman is a kind human being first and foremost, and it is an integral part of being this superhero. That is all he knows is humanity, so the idea that he is an alien from another planet doesn't truly cross his mind. He knows he is from Krypton, but he does not know much about the planet, because he came to Earth as an infant. As he tells Lex Luthor in the final fight scene, "I'm as human as anyone. I love, I get scared. I wake up every morning and, despite not knowing what to do, I put one foot in front of the other and I try to make the best choices I can. I screw up all the time, but that is being human. And that's my greatest strength."

It is this idea that makes Superman one of, if not the most, iconic superheroes of all time. He gives a part of himself when the world needs him to; he gives every ounce of himself to the service of others. That is what makes Superman the ultimate Jewish role model, a superhero created by Jews, preaching Jewish values (specifically Tikkun Olam), and making sure he holds himself accountable, even going so far as to turn himself in, when he has done nothing wrong, just for the sake of Shalom Bayit.

I personally also love Spider-Man for this exact reason. He wakes up every day as normal Peter Parker, but does incredible things in the service of others, even at the cost of his own personal success. I used to love comic books as a kid, specifically Spider-Man, Batman, and Superman. My grandma used to buy me a new comic book every so often after school, and I'd go home and read the same material for hours on end. I loved them for the idea that these were superheroes fighting crime with cool action. Now that I am old enough to understand the themes behind these characters, I have developed a deeper appreciation for the heroes and the choices they make. It reminds me that even though they have powers or resources others may not, they are, in a way, just like me. They just try to do the best they can, just like I try to.

Ultimately, I am sure I have given this message before, but as the High Holidays come to a close, we all need to be reminded sometimes that it is ok to be scared and not know what to do; all we can keep doing is put one foot in front of the other, and keep doing the best we can. We also should not be afraid of our mistakes, because they, in time, can become our strengths. In fact, we have an entire part of the Yom Kippur Service to recognizing our mistakes, Selichot. The ability to acknowledge our errors and attempt to atone, correct, and improve is one of our greatest strengths as human beings.

Haverim,

As a young child, I remember my maternal grandfather, William Chait, retelling his memories of the Nikolaev Pogrom. Nikolaev is a port city on the Black Sea in what is now Ukraine. In my grandfather's time, the Jewish population of Nikolaev was around 20,000, amounting to almost 22% of the total population. Jews there suffered in the pogroms of May 1881 and April 1899 (which my grandfather described to me). He vividly recalled that his family had to hide in the basement for 24 hours and had nothing more than the equivalent of a cup of water for each member of the family to sustain them. Many Jewish friends and neighbors were murdered, while others suffered from the brutality of the attackers.

On October 7, 2023, communities in southern Israel were attacked by Hamas and several other Palestinian militant groups. The horrors of the Nikolaev Pogrom were recurring. In total, almost 1200 people were killed, and many more were wounded by the attacks. An additional 250 people were taken hostage and brought into Gaza to face indescribable brutality. Dozens of cases of rape and sexual assault reportedly occurred. Had my grandfather been alive in 2023, this would have been déjà vu for him. History does repeat itself.

The horrors of October 7 set off a new and frightening wave of antisemitism around the world. According to the ADL, there were 8,873 antisemitic incidents across the United States in 2023, which represented a 140% increase from incidents in 2022 and the highest since 1979. It reported a 200% increase in antisemitic incidents from October 7, 2023, to September 24, 2024. According to the FBI's 2023 statistics, antisemitic incidents accounted for 68% of all religion-based hate crimes.

So, what did they do in Nikolaev to avert 20th-century pogroms? Jewish self-defense units averted a pogrom in 1905. At TBS, we have enhanced our security in multiple ways. Additionally, we have reached out to our Christian friends and neighbors, forging a Jewish-Christian Alliance. Through the promotion of goodwill and mutual understanding, we are developing strong bonds that provide the best way of combating antisemitism. Last year, we established our annual Inter-faith Sukkot Luncheon. Despite the results of Hurricane Milton, we had a good turnout from both TBS and the Christian Community. The luncheon is cosponsored by Sisterhood and Men's Club. At this gathering, we have an opportunity to teach our Christian friends about Sukkot; to hear an inspiring speaker, and all proceeds go to the local food banks. It's a wonderful opportunity for Christians and Jews to break bread together in good fellowship. Just as important, this event helps to strengthen the bonds established by the Jewish-Christian Alliance. This year's speaker is Reverand Kenneth Blythe. The date of the luncheon is October 9. If you have not registered for the luncheon, I encourage you to do so today! Your participation in this very special event serves to support our Jewish-Christian Alliance, supports our local food banks, and adds new meaning to the holiday of Sukkot. I hope to see each of you in attendance.

Erev Yom Kippur is October 1. I want to wish you and yours an easy but meaningful fast. If I have done anything to offend you in the past year, please forgive me.

In the Main Library, there are also interesting books which are arranged by Fiction (in order by author), Biography (in order by subject), and Nonfiction topics such as Bible, Holidays, History, and Israel - see the labels on the top of each bookshelf. Nonfiction books are arranged by the Weine Classification System for Judaica Libraries (similar to the Dewey Decimal system). On top of the bookshelf near the back door of the Main Library, there is a black binder that contains a detailed list of the Weine System sections and a relative index.

# NEW FICTION BOOKS IN THE ALCOVE

Ava and Shalom by Kate Birkin, 2024 - Their entire lives they believed they were German until the truth sent them to Auschwitz-Birkenau. A truly unforgettable story of love and survival that celebrates family, resilience, and the enduring power of hope.

An Inside Job by Daniel Silva, 2025 – Art restorer and legendary spy Gabriel Allon must solve the perfect crime in this dazzling new tale of murder, greed, and corruption.

The sisters find themselves caught between tradition and their own hearts in this story about dating, ambition, and coming-of-age within an immigrant community whose affection is endearing, maddening and never boring.

Step beyond the sign and you will be amazed by a half-acre tropical garden and path containing mature fruit trees that are tall, fragrant, and fruitful! In spring and summer, you will find a variety of colorful fruits at different stages of ripeness, including mango (of two varieties), lime, starfruit, banana, avocado, peach, fig, and pomegranate. Only the olive tree has not borne fruit, because the olive requires cold weather in the winter. (Hey, Olive, you and me both!)

Congregants may pick one or two fruits to eat. To take any more than that, please ask permission from Troy Jones at the synagogue office. In the past, TBS has offered fruits from the orchard at kiddush and seder events, and this would be a lovely tradition to revive.



The memorial plaques, placed at each tree by the former religious school, represent donations in memory of dear ones. If anyone would like to provide details about these dear people and the origin of the orchard, I would like to add this information to a sequel article. The orchard is at least twenty years old.

TBS plans to move the trees and placards to the Lyle Street side when the second building and associated land are sold in the near future. There will be a view of the orchard from the outside doors of the Sanctuary and Social Hall. The future location, like the current one, will be adjacent to the magnificent live oak trees behind the synagogue. Depending on how much additional room will be available, we may be able to plant more trees, keep the orchard park bench, and offer our congregants the opportunity to place their own memorial plaques.

The Memorial Orchard flourishes under the care of the House & Grounds Committee, headed by Elliott Corn, Duane Rushing, Facilities Manager, and Troy Jones, the Marketing & Media Manager. We are fortunate that Troy is a plant expert with a lifelong passion for the environment. I recently enjoyed an impromptu tour with Troy of the orchard to prepare this article. I'm certain other Congregants would enjoy a little tour with Elliott or Troy!
