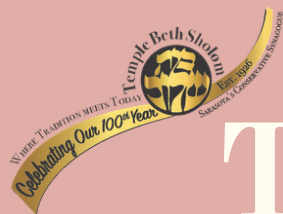

RABBI'S MESSAGE

Dear Friends,

With the final shofar blasts at the end of Yom Kippur services, we rush off to our break-the-fast bagels and lox, or whatever our carb of choice might be, ready to greet the coming year. For so many of us, that is where the experience of the High Holy Day season comes to its conclusion. Sukkot can be difficult to relate to, with its complicated choreography of lulav waving, and by the time we get to Simchat Torah and Shemini Atzeret, we're so exhausted from the previous holidays that the very thought of heading back into the Sanctuary for even more time in Shul makes us want to plotz. But I wouldn't be your Rabbi if I didn't take this moment to remind you of the incredible spiritual power held within the final Yom Tov days of the holiday season, as well as all of the new programming we have in store at TBS.

First there is Sukkot. One of the mystical traditions of Sukkot is the concept of Ushpizin, the Aramaic word for guests. Tracing its roots to the central book of Kabbalah, the Zohar, this tradition asks us to imagine that on each day of Sukkot it is as if we are being joined in our Sukkah by "guests" from Jewish history. If Avraham, or King David were to sit down next to you in your Sukkah and join you for some cake, what wisdom, what advice, would they offer you? Well we may not actually get a visit from Elijah or Sarah or Rebecca, but regardless, this year I want YOU to be my Ushpizin, my guests. On Tuesday, September 29th and Thursday October 1st, from Noon to 2PM, I will be holding a "step into the Sukkah" potluck lunch. All are invited to join me in the TBS Sukkah during those times for an informal chance to get to know each other better, to meet new friends, and a lesson in how to wave the Lulav for all who want to try the Mitzvah! Bring a dairy lunch, and bring a friend - ALL are welcome.

After Sukkot, on Saturday night, October 3rd, beginning at 6 PM, the party begins.

Simchat Torah, our celebration of the wisdom of the Torah, is not to be missed this year. We are returning to a favorite tradition of mine: Unrolling the entire Sefer Torah. Join Cantor and I for a whirlwind trip through the entirety of the Torah from the first Bet to the final Lamed, learning interesting Torah trivia along the way, and seeing the details of the Torah up close and personal in a way that you never have an opportunity to during normal services. Everything you've ever needed to know to impress your friends with your knowledge of the Torah will be right there on the table, so bring a friend, bring kids or grandkids, and let's celebrate our beautiful heritage together.

Of course, there will be plenty of snacks and Simcha dancing as the night progresses.

If you are typically a "done after Yom Kippur" kind of Jew, give yourself a spiritual gift and try something new this year. Join me in the Sukkah, be my guest. Join us at our Simchat Torah festivities and see the Torah like never before. Together, let's start the new year strong - it's going to be a wonderful, meaningful, and exciting year for our community, and I can't wait for all the good that is yet to come.

In addition to the very busy schedule of High Holy Day services and events, let's not forget the Interfaith Sukkot luncheon on September 30. Let's FILL the Sukkah this year with members and guests!

CANTOR'S MESSAGE

Shalom Chaverim,

I can't believe we are already in the Holiday season. It always feels like it comes so quickly and it is over before you know it. Amidst all of the craziness, there is one point during this season that we celebrate not only our joy-hence why this holiday is called Zman Simchateinu, the time of our happiness-but also the idea of coming together to celebrate that joy. We all come together to eat our meals and even chill in the comfort and shelter of the sukkah for 8 days as we remember our exodus from Egypt. While Sukkot is the time of our happiness and we are supposed to feel immense joy about our freedom, another feeling gets lost in the shuffle of this amazing chag, the feeling of safety and comfort.

What's really great about this holiday is that the sukkah is the physical embodiment of a prayer we already say every day, Hashkiveinu. The most intriguing part of this parallel is the beginning of the prayer; "הַשְׁכִּיבֵנוּ יְהוָה אֱלֹהֵינוּ לְשָׁלוֹם וְהַעֲמִידֵנוּ מִלְּכָנוּ לְחַיִּים" "וּפְרוֹשׁ עָלֵינוּ סֶכֶת שְׁלוֹמְךָ" "Hashem our God; make us lie down in peace, our King, raise us again to life Spread over us the shelter of Your peace." In our sukkah, the world feels far away, as we are commanded to be joyful. When we enter our sukkah, we feel safe. Perhaps that's fitting given how the word "sukat" is translated as shelter. It is a special thing to see our daily liturgy take shape in the form of a major holiday.

Everyone who enters our sukkah can feel the safety and shelter of the Sukkah. When people enter the TBS Sukkah, it is on us to welcome our guests with open arms. Maya Angelou once said: "The ache for home lives in all of us. The safe place where we can go as we are and not be questioned." The more people who come to our sukkah seeking a place to feel safe for a while, the more we need to be ready to welcome them in our midst.

As we gather in the Sukkah and share meals and time together, let us be empowered to find tranquillity, as we pray every night that Hashem spread over us the shelter of His peace. May we find the shade and shelter to be healing. May we find comfort in each other and all of those we may cross paths with.

Play Makers: The Jewish Entrepreneurs Who Created The Toy Industry In America by Michael Kimmel, 2026

– A unique, illuminating story of the first-generation Jewish American toymakers who literally manufactured “the century of the child.” In 1902, Morris and Rose Michtom invented the Teddy Bear—bound by clothing scraps, stuffed with sawdust, and given button eyes with a sad, longing expression—in the back room of their Brooklyn candy store. Together they launched the Ideal Toy Corporation, joining a set of other poor, first-generation Jewish toymakers: the Hassenfeld brothers of Hasbro, Ruth Moskowitz and Elliot Handler of Mattel, and Joshua Lionel Cowan of Lionel Trains. Along with the toys and Jewish toymakers that climbed the ladder of success, the author also portrays the rise of an entire culture focused on children, led by Jewish comic book creators, children’s authors, parenting experts, and child psychologists.

The Jewish South: An American Story by Shari Rabin, 2025 – This panoramic history offers a compelling and colorful portrait of the Jewish experience in the South in all its complexity. Paying particular attention to race and religion, the author explains how the region shaped Jewish life across more than three centuries. The author sheds new light on the complicated decisions that southern Jews made—as individuals, families, and communities—to fit into a society built on Native land and enslaved labor and to maintain forms of Jewish difference, often through religious innovation and adaptation.

India Interlude by Benita Stambler, 2025 – It’s 1971, and a diverse group of Americans arrives in a relatively unknown corner of India, suddenly staying for several months. They are at first bewildered by their surroundings, but soon become enthralled with this fascinating country and its people. India is changing. World events impinge on the group’s daily lives, imbuing their experiences with conflict, romance, and intercultural complexities, creating profound personal changes.

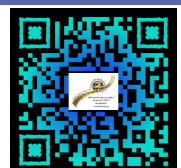

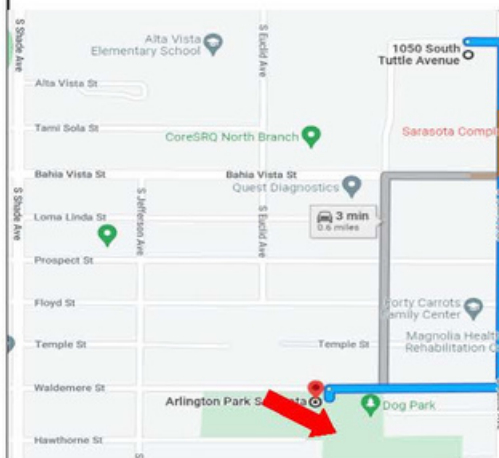

Sukkot commemorates our ancestral journey in the depths of the desert. The weeklong festival is observed by building and spending time in a Sukkah, a temporary outdoor structure, to connect to the harvest season. Along with eating meals in the Sukkah, we life and shake the Lulav (a bouquet made up of a palm branch, three branches of myrtle, and two willow branches) with an etrog (a fragrant, yellow or green bumpy citrus fruit also known as a citron).

TBS SISTERHOOD GREEN BEAN CASSEROLE

Ingredients:

- 32 oz frozen green beans
- 10 oz cream of mushroom soup, undiluted
- 1/2 cup of mayonnaise
- 1 Tbsp olive oil
- 1 Tbsp lemon juice
- 1/2 cup grated cheese
- 1 cup crushed cheese crackers

Directions:

1. Preheat oven to 350 F.
2. Cook green beans according to package directions and drain.
3. Pour the beans into a 9"x 13" disposable aluminum pan.
4. Spoon a mixture of the soup, mayonnaise, olive oil, lemon juice, and cheese over the beans. Top with crushed crackers.
5. Bake the covered pan for 20-25 minutes.
6. Cool, cover with foil, and freeze.

Variations: Add cooked carrots, corn, beans, broccoli, mushrooms, fried onions, pasta, or slivered nuts.
Adjust the wet mixture as needed.

Put your last name on masking tape on the foil.

Bring to the Temple the week of delivery and ask a TBS Staff member to place it in the walk-in freezer.

Ruth Bader Ginsburg – “I Dissent”

Ruth Bader Ginsburg was an American lawyer and jurist who served as an associate justice of the Supreme Court of the United States from 1993 until her death in September 2020. She was the second woman and the first Jewish woman ever appointed to the Court and became the longest serving Jewish Justice.

She championed fairness and equality and objected to different expectations for men and women, prejudice against minority groups in places like hotels and restaurants, and women having fewer job opportunities than men. Ruth served on the national board of the ACLU (American Civil Liberties Union) and launched The Women's Rights Project, she continued to be a leading voice for gender equality, women's interests, and civil rights and liberties.
